## **CENTENNIAL MIDDLE SCHOOL STUDENT EXPECTATIONS**

### **We follow a system of “Positive Behavior Support” (PBS)**

We acknowledge and reward clearly defined positive student behavior and we teach our expectations in a direct manner. We hold students accountable for their behaviors while students are acknowledged for positive behavior!

### **HOW WE COMMUNICATE WITH OUR PARENTS**

In an effort to help our parents understand this process better, we have put together this information sheet on the various communication channels available to them.

**The Cyclone News,** our school newsletter, is mailed home periodically throughout the year. It contains information about upcoming events, students, staff and district activities. A two-month calendar is regularly included. We also have the newsletter available by email.

**Back to School Night** provides parents with the opportunity to get an overview of their children’s program through short visits to each class. Back to School Night will be on **Wednesday, September 2.**

**Infinite Campus** is an online access to your student’s academic information. Using this tool, you’ll be able to view schedules, grades, attendance and more. We encourage you to use this tool in collaboration with your child. Parent Portal letters will be available at the Back to School Night.

**Mid-quarter progress notices** are sent home by teachers to the parents of students who may be having some challenges in a particular course. Some teachers may send home computerized progress reports for all students on a more regular basis. Others send progress notices to all students. The formal mid-term reports are mailed after the fourth week of each quarter.

**Quarter Grade Reports** are sent home with students approximately 7 work days after the end of the quarter (nine week grading period). Report card dates will be included in the *Cyclone News*.

**Parent-Teacher Conferences** will be held on October 6, 8, 20 and 22, January 20 and February 18. Parents and students will have an opportunity to meet with teachers during conferences.

**Student Planners** will be passed out during the first week of school. We strongly encourage students to maintain a daily planner by recording homework assignments/projects on a daily basis. The planner should be carried between home and school every day. We encourage parents to support your children in using their planners.

**Student-circulated weekly progress reports** for all grades can be arranged through the counseling office. At the request of a parent, the student will pick up a weekly progress report form which all teachers are asked to sign. Parents are responsible for holding students accountable for bringing these reports home and our counselors help in any way they can.

**Voicemail & E-mail** to teachers is welcome any time that a parent has a question or a concern regarding a student’s progress. Teachers will make every effort to respond to these concerns as soon as possible. A list of teacher voice mail numbers and email addresses will be available at the Back to School Night.

**Conferences** with a particular teacher or teachers can be requested at any time by a parent. Every effort will be made to arrange these as soon as possible. In order to request such a conference, parents can contact the teacher directly or ask the counselor to contact the teacher(s).

**Counselors** serve as a vital link between home and school. Your counselor can act as a liaison between home and school. You can contact your child’s counselor through voicemail or e-mail at any time. For the 2009-2010 school year, Debra Kennedy will be the counselor for all of 6th grade and for 7th grade (L-Z). Kristin Westman will be the counselor for 7th grade (A-K) and for all of 8th grade.

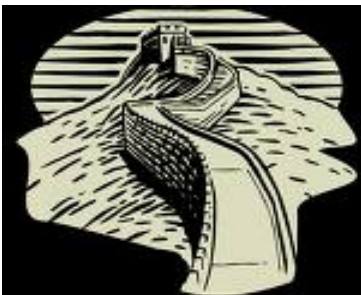
## **TALENTED AND GIFTED (TAG) NEWS**

## Confront Teens about Sexting



May of last year, we first brought you [news](#) of an emerging trend among young people—the sharing of sexual images and texts through cell phones, commonly known as SEXTING. Due to the widespread availability of mobile technology, the sky-high hormone levels of young people, and the difficulty that they can have understanding the consequences of their decisions, not-so-innocent text messages are being sent from cell phones all over America.

It's particularly distressing when the consequences of sexting get so out of hand that a teenager feels the only solution is suicide. When Jesse Logan pressed 'send' from her cell phone, she did not imagine that an audience beyond her boyfriend would receive her nude pictures.

As trusted adults with a mission to protect children online, engage your communities on the issue of sexting. Share these tips with young people so that they are better informed. To read more about the tragic story of Jesse Logan, visit the NetSmartz [blog](#).

### Tips to Prevent Sexting

**THINK ABOUT THE CONSEQUENCES** of taking, sending, or forwarding a sexual picture of someone underage, even if it's of you. You could get kicked off of sports teams, face humiliation, lose educational opportunities, and even get in trouble with the law.

**NEVER TAKE** images of yourself that you wouldn't want everyone—your classmates, your teachers, your family, or your employers—to see.

**BEFORE HITTING SEND**, remember that you can't control where this image may travel. What you send to a boyfriend or girlfriend could easily end up with their friends, and their friends, and their friends...

**IF YOU FORWARD** a sexual picture of someone underage, you are as responsible for this image as the original sender. You could face child pornography charges, go to jail, and have to register as a sex offender.

**REPORT** any nude pictures you receive on your cell phone to an adult you trust. Do not delete the message. Instead, get your parents or guardians, teachers, and school counselors involved immediately.

### NEW VACCINE REQUIREMENTS (09-10)

#### **2<sup>nd</sup> dose Varicella (chickenpox) REQUIRED FOR ALL KINDERGARTNERS, 1<sup>ST</sup> and 2<sup>ND</sup> GRADERS**

Varicella (chickenpox) is a disease that is very contagious, and there continue to be outbreaks of the disease in Colorado as well as other states around the country. As a result of continued outbreaks, even in children who have had one injection of Varicella vaccine, next year the state of Colorado requires a second dose of Varicella vaccine beginning at kindergarten as well as 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> grade entry. It is the responsibility of the parents to provide an updated record of immunization to the school.

It continues to be a rule, that if a child has had chickenpox disease, a laboratory test showing immunity or a documented disease history from a **health care provider** is acceptable. In Colorado, children will need to have the appropriate documentation of two doses of Varicella vaccine at entry into Kindergarten, 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> grade as well as the other vaccine requirements.

If you do not wish your child to have this vaccine for personal or religious reasons, please sign a waiver that is available in the Health Room. A medical exemption must be signed by a physician.

#### **Tdap REQUIRED FOR 6<sup>TH</sup>, 7<sup>TH</sup>, 8<sup>TH</sup>, 10<sup>TH</sup>, 11<sup>TH</sup>, AND 12<sup>TH</sup>**

Pertussis (whooping cough) can be a very serious disease in infants and small children. It has been found that siblings who have Pertussis disease can frequently expose other children in the household. Colorado ranks fifth of all states in the country with this disease. Per Colorado state law, Tdap vaccine will be required for all 6<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, 8<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, 11, and 12<sup>th</sup> grade students the upcoming school year (09-10). It is the responsibility of the parents to provide an updated record of immunization to the school. If you do not wish your child to have this vaccine for personal or religious reasons, please sign a waiver that is available in the Health Room. A medical exemption must be signed by a physician.

Parents of 6<sup>th</sup> graders: The most commonly used vaccine for Tdap in the Boulder area requires that the child be at least 11 years old. If your child is entering 6<sup>th</sup> grade and is not yet 11, please check with your provider ahead of time to see if you will need to wait until the 11<sup>th</sup> birthday.
