NOTES FROM PRINCIPAL JOAN BLUDORN

Fall is off to a great start. Our **enrollment** is back to what we had last spring before graduation; we are currently working from a “wait list” for Arapahoe Ridge High School and continuing to “con-currently enroll” Options Academy students. The Career and Technical Education Center is nearly at full capacity and we are having conversations about programs that will be available to students across the district for second semester.

We had our yearly **Open House** for Arapahoe Campus, August 25. Our first parent/teacher conference date is set for September 29, from 3:00 P.M. to 7:00 P.M. Both the high school and Options teachers will be available on that evening to discuss your student’s progress. Our TEC teachers are meeting the needs of students and high schools by attending the neighborhood schools for their conference night; making contact for parents a one-stop-shop for student progress information. More details will follow as conference time gets closer for each high school. Note that a table will be set up for conference night at Arapahoe Campus as well. Grades will be available for all TEC programs.

Our entire campus is working diligently on the school improvement plan (SIP). This year we are again working on literacy and numeracy for ALL students. Be sure to ask your student how teachers are incorporating a variety of reading and mathematics activities into the classroom and TEC programs.

The School Improvement Team will also begin meeting this year. The first teacher/parent meeting will be held September 21,

2:45-3:45. This event is held monthly and parents are encouraged to come and learn more about how our school improvement plan is implemented. We also encourage input for concerns within our learning community that a parent may observe through their student. Please plan on attending this event, everyone is welcome!

Looking ahead to May...it may seem too early, but we have increased our **graduation rate** to the point of needing a large facility. For the second year in a row, we will have our graduation ceremony at **Fairview’s auditorium** and have already begun plans for the big event. Mark, May 19, 10:00 A.M. on your calendar. Many students will graduate this fall or throughout the school year, but we encourage families to participate in the ceremony of graduation in May as a final celebration.

Boulder TEC has hired a district counselor, Andy Tucker, to oversee the individual career and academic planning (ICAP) for students in BVSD. Andy will have close contact with high school counselors for that process along with communicating the opportunities and processes for registering juniors and seniors for classes at TEC.

Our school newsletter will be sent out via email every other month this year. If you would like to receive a printed copy in the mail, please notify the school.

RAMP

Restorative Academics at My Pace



A long time proponent of reducing the dropout rate for Boulder Valley School District (BVSD), Assistant Superintendent Dr. Deirdre Pilch has put into place the resources needed to encourage students to give the dream of graduation a second look. Dr. Pilch has formed a strong relationship with Colorado Youth for Change and together has built an avenue to reduce BVSD's dropout rate. This program gives students who struggle with a full time school schedule a chance to complete their high school graduation requirements and earn their high school diploma.

In its second year, the RAMP program has been designed to run on a flexible schedule that works around the time constraints of its students. Its mission is to coach and mentor students back into an academic life, and to enlist the community support systems that will stabilize the students' life so that academic goals can be reached. RAMP is operated on the same model as the successful Options Academy and also utilizes the classes available through Boulder Universal's online learning.

The ultimate goal is to have students re-enroll into high school and receive their diploma. To date RAMP has seen one student

graduate and two other students re-enroll full time.

RAMP is housed on the Arapahoe Campus and is overseen by Principal Joan Blutorn. She describes RAMP as a safe harbor for students and a place to ease back into the rigors of high school. She is a strong advocate for the non-traditional students of BVSD but at the same time maintains high expectations of achievement for all of the students on her campus.

Christen Ibarra is the BVSD Outreach Specialist. She is the representative from Colorado Youth for Change. Her roll is to contact former students and their families, assesses the needs of the family, and she coordinates the services that can be put into place to bring students back to school. Charles Haseman is the teacher in the RAMP classroom. He is highly qualified in science and teaches those classes. He also works as an academic coach encouraging students in their other disciples. Mr. Haseman also works closely with school councilors and helps design graduations paths for each student.

RAMP currently operates from 11:00 am to 2:40 pm and serves 14 students. ■



First Graduate of 11-12 School Year

BVSD Senior Assad Mohebi graduated on August 26th with successful completion in the RAMP program. He had attended Centaurus High School, and he also attended Boulder Prep for some of his high school studies. He was able to graduate with a full Boulder Valley diploma.

He came in with a friend and put on the cap and gown. An all school announcement was made that he'd completed the BVSD graduation requirements and Pomp and Circumstance was played.

Assad has been taking classes at Front Range for 3 semesters, and will now be eligible for his associates degree by completing his high school diploma. His goal is to join the military as an interpreter.

New Mushroom Playhouse

in the Early Childhood Education Program Playground by Georgia Pearson



Over the summer, a new play item was added to the infants and toddlers playground in the Nursery Learning Center. The nursery director, Amy Carlough, explained that the children were always searching for something to climb on, so after a few weeks of looking for an infant and toddler safe play set, she came across the mushroom play house.

The mushroom is a hollow play structure where the children can get fresh air, and practice their “large motor skills”. Large motor skills are something that is a necessary practice for infants and toddlers because it allows them the opportunity to make big movements in another environment, rather than making small movements in a more confined space.

The mushroom play place is on a rubberized surface so it is safe for the children to play on, without the worry of getting hurt. There is a balance beam, a kiddie maze structure, and a sand pit to play in, as well as little bikes, balls, and a lot of variety of equipment that can help to develop many skills. Both the children and staff members are thrilled to acquire the newest addition of play material into the play ground. ■

The gardens are just the beginning of more similar projects. Mrs. Riffel said, “We are really hoping to increase food production this year; we want to start raising chickens, bees, and even fish (Aquaponics).” ■

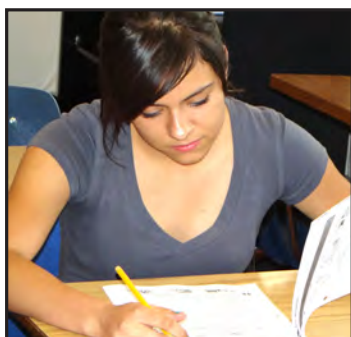
Students New to the Country are Welcomed at Arapahoe Campus

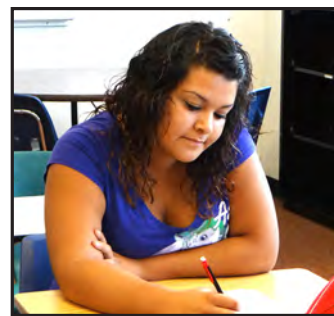

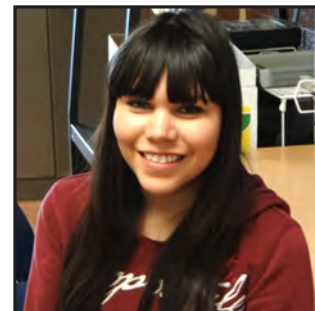

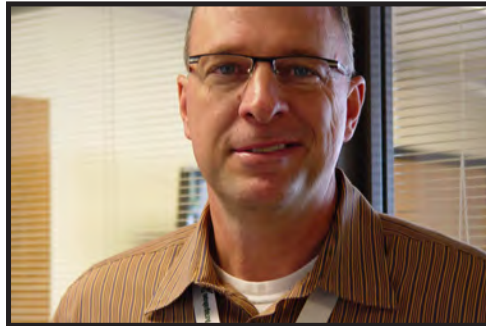

School Messenger and Contact Manager

En enero de 2010, BVSD comenzó a usar SchoolMessenger para enviar varias comunicaciones del distrito y de las escuelas a los padres y al personal del distrito. * Su información de contacto tal como aparece en Infinite Campus es actualizada todas las noches en el sistema de SchoolMessenger, así que es muy importante que la información esté correcta en Infinite Campus. Si no está correcta, por favor comuníquese con su escuela para actualizar su información. Una de las características del sistema SchoolMessenger es que los padres y el personal del distrito pueden indicar su preferencia de qué números de teléfono o direcciones de e-mail usar, dependiendo del tipo de notificación que se envíe. Se pueden agregar números de teléfono celular para recibir mensajes de texto. Esta característica se llama “Administrador de contactos” (Contact Manager). School Messenger and Contact Manager

In January 2010, BVSD began using SchoolMessenger to send various communications from the district and schools to parents and staff. This includes attendance calls, meal account balance notices, emails from the superintendent, and emergency notifications.

*A test “emergency” phone call and email will be sent out via SchoolMessenger to all BVSD Parents on Thursday, Sept. 29.

* Your contact information as it appears in Infinite Campus is uploaded into the SchoolMessenger system every night, so it is very important that your information is correct in Infinite Campus. If it is not correct, please contact your school to have your information updated. A nice feature of the SchoolMessenger system is that parents and staff can set their own preferences for which telephone numbers or email addresses are used depending on what sort of communication is being sent. You can also enter a cell phone number in order to receive text messages. This feature is called “Contact Manager.” BVSD Communications will email details to you about Contact Manager in early September OR you can learn more about it now in the parent section of the BVSD website at <http://www.bvsd.org/parents/Pages/default.aspx>. ■
