Dear Broomfield Parents:

First semester 2011-2012 is over; final exams have been completed and students, staff, and parents are now enjoying a well-deserved break to spend time with family and friends during this holiday season. As we look forward to returning in January for second semester, I would like to share updates with you regarding our work with your students.

1. Our 2012 Graduation ceremony has been set. Senior parents were notified by email in late November and the information was shared in last month's newsletter. To insure that all interested families have this information, I wish to share the information again:

2. This year, the SAC (School Accountability Committee) and staff have diligently worked on the development and implementation of our UIP (Unified Improvement Plan) as required by our district and CDE (Colorado Department of Education). Based on data from 2010-2011, we determined school-wide areas of growth and individual departments developed their own goals to work on this year. Our collaboration time each Wednesday morning has allowed us time to work together on a regular basis in developing, implementing and assessing strategies.

The department goals this year are:

**Bus/Comp Science** – Students will complete 97% of assignments with a “C” or better.

**Family and Consumer Science** – Decrease D’s and F’s by 2%.

**Library** – Increase positive responses on the School Climate Survey by 3% on the following questions: The school sets high and realistic expectations for students. The School has clear rules for behavior.

**Lang Arts** – Improve median growth percentile by 5 points within ELL population in CSAP writing.

**Mathematics** – To reduce the number of D’s and F’s by 2% for ELL and SPED students.

**Physical Education** – We will increase cognitive and physical district assessment scores by 2% for all of our SPED and ELL students on the 2011-2012 assessments. We will continue to build positive and appropriate relationships with our students.

**Science** – Increase mean scores on CSAP to 500 for Life Science and Life Processes.

**Social Studies** – Decrease the % of D’s received by SPED students by 5%. In addition, a drop in the number of non-proficient scores on CSAP reading by 10%.

**Visual Arts** – Reduce D’s and F’s for ELL and FRL students to below 20%.

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**World Lang** – To maintain high Level 2 speaking assessment proficiency in French and German (80% and 82%) and increase proficiency levels in Spanish by 5%(from 43.3% to 48.3%).

In addition to our department goals, we have set annual performance targets in the area of Academic Achievement, Academic Growth, Academic Growth Gaps, and School Climate. As first semester grades are finalized, I will be giving a mid-year report on our goals.

3. I encourage you to review your student's schedule for next semester. Freshman and sophomore students are required to have at least 6 classes per semester, while juniors and seniors are required to have at least 5 classes. If there are still concerns with schedules, I ask that your students come to the Counseling Office on Jan 3 (the day before classes begin) to fix their schedules. My expectation is that all students are in class on Jan. 4 and not seeking schedule changes. Thank you for your help with this request.

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## COUNSELING INFO:

### FINANCIAL AID NIGHT . . . . .

The University of Denver will be presenting a Financial Aid Night on Tuesday, January 24 in the Library.

The program will begin promptly at 7:00pm, and both students and parents are invited to attend to learn more about the financial aid process.

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## Q & A ABOUT FAFSA AND FINANCIAL AID . . . . .

Now is the time for filing for financial aid. Students and parents will need to complete the FAFSA form on-line at [www.fafsa.ed.gov](http://www.fafsa.ed.gov) to apply for most grants, college work-study and loans. Some colleges will also require additional applications. In order to complete the FAFSA, most students and their parents will need to complete or estimate their taxes for 2012. Here are a few commonly asked questions about financial aid.

### **What types of financial aid are available?**

Grants, scholarships, college work-study and student loans are available. Most comes from the federal government, the rest from the state (where the student usually must be a resident), the school or private sources. **For federal aid, students and parents must complete the FAFSA.**

### **What are the particulars?**

Grants and scholarships do NOT have to be repaid. Federal grants include the Pell Grant and the Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant (SEOG). The Pell Grant goes to eligible students. Schools offer the SEOG to students with exceptional need.

College work-study dollars are awarded based on financial need as part of the financial aid package. Students find a campus-based job and receive a paycheck up to the amount of the work-study financial award.

Student loans are borrowed like car or house loans and students MUST REPAY them. Typical loans are the PLUS Loan (a parent loan) or the STAFFORD Loan (a student loan).

Scholarships require separate applications. A good time to begin a scholarship search is during your junior year in high school, or the year before the student plans to attend school.

### **What happens after a student files the FAFSA?**

You'll receive financial aid from your school's financial aid office. Results from the FAFSA provide the student and family with the **Estimated Family Contribution (EFC)**, or the amount the family is expected to pay. The FAFSA determines how much you and your family can afford based on income, assets, and the number of people in your family. The school deducts the **Cost of Attendance (COA)** to determine your financial need. The **EFC** will remain the same no matter what school the student attends. The **COA** differs from school to school.

### **What does it mean when a college/university says that they "meet need"?**

This means that the total cost of the education is covered by loans, grants, scholarships and family contribution. Some schools are able to meet need or others or not. This will vary from family to family and school to school.

**Please do not wait to file the FAFSA. Several colleges have reported that they depleted their funds prior to their recommended deadline last year.**

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### **DROPPING CLASSES . . . . .**

Students are allowed to drop a class during the first 15 days of a semester with no grade reported on the student's transcript. Students have until January 25, 2012 for a "clean" drop. Following this date, students have the option of a WP (withdraw passing) or WF (withdraw failing) until February 15, 2012. Any course dropped after this date will result in an "F" grade. Dropping a class during the WP / WF period requires signatures from parent, counselor, teacher and administrator. For further information, please see a counselor.

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### **COLLEGE DEADLINES APPROACHING . . . . .**

College application and scholarship deadline are quickly approaching. Please take note of the following:

Colorado State University – Freshmen who are admitted and meet all eligibility criteria by March 1, 2012 automatically will be considered for admission-based merit scholarships. (Online at <http://ramweb.colostate.edu> )

Colorado College – Applicants must submit a complete admission application in addition to the Profile application and FAFSA application. These forms should be submitted as early as possible. In addition, Colorado College highly recommends an interview.

Fort Lewis College – Priority filing for FAFSA is February 15, 2012.

Front Range Community College – FAFSA and scholarship deadline March 1, 2012.

Metro State – FAFSA deadline March 1, 2012.

CU – Boulder – Submit FAFSA as soon as possible. Scholarship information can be obtained at [www.colorado.edu/finaid/scholarships/html](http://www.colorado.edu/finaid/scholarships/html).

CU- Colorado Springs – FAFSA deadline March 1, 2012 for maximum consideration.

CU-Denver – Freshmen are automatically considered for academic achievement scholarships if accepted for admission by February 1, 2012. FAFSA should be submitted as soon as possible.

University of Northern Colorado – Priority consideration March 1, 2012 for FAFSA.

If you have additional questions, contact the financial aid office at the specific college or university to which you are applying.

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### **ARE YOU MOVING OR CHANGING SCHOOLS?**

If you will be withdrawing from Broomfield High School before the end of this school year, please note that you will be required to complete a withdrawal form. This form may take up to 24 hours to complete, as it requires signatures from the student’s teachers and counselor. In addition, all books must be collected before a grade will be given. This form will be requested by the new school that the student attends. Thank you for your patience with this process.

## **OPEN ENROLLMENT NEWS . . . . .**

Broomfield High School, in conjunction with BVSD, has begun the open enrollment (OE) process for the 2012 – 2013 school year. This is a centralized process with all final decisions being determined at the district's Education Center. This procedure has been put in place to allow students who do not reside in the Broomfield High School attendance area to apply for the opportunity to attend school here. **Current Broomfield High School students who do not reside in the attendance area and are not currently open enrolled into the school must apply for open enrollment to remain enrolled for the 2012-2013 school year.**

Open enrollment applications for students wishing to attend BrHS or requesting OE to another BVSD school became available on November 28 and may be completed and submitted online at [www/bvbsd.org](http://www/bvbsd.org). The open enrollment process concludes on January 13, 2012. **All OE applications must be submitted online by 4 p.m. on January 13, 2012, to be considered for the 2012-13 school year.**

**Dear BHS Senior Parents:**

Have fun reminiscing with your senior as you create the Senior Poster for Just After Midnight (JAM), the after prom party which is hosted at BHS from midnight until 5:00 a.m. Each senior's family is asked to make a poster with various pictures of their graduates. These posters are displayed at JAM in the senior hall. This tradition is enjoyed not only by the graduates but by all who attend the JAM Open House on Prom night. We have over 300 graduates this year so only one poster per graduate please.

## **POSTER GUIDELINES:**

- Poster size must be no larger than 22 x 28 inches and poster board can be purchased most anywhere -- King Soopers, Safeway, Hobby Lobby or Michaels. Please **do not use foam board** as it is too heavy to mount on the walls. Please do not add beads, etc. All decorations need to be flat due to the lamination process.
- Decorate the poster to hang **VERTICAL**. Stay within the confines of the poster board. Cut out figures and add-ons exceeding the dimensions of the poster board make it difficult to hang in the space restraints given.
- All posters must be laminated. Please, no plastic wrap!
- It is best to make copies of the pictures because once the poster is laminated it is impossible to remove the photos. Lamination of the posters is required by the fire marshall/fire code of Broomfield.
- Be sure that the **first and last name of the graduate is written on the back** of the poster even if their name is displayed on the front.

## **DUE DATE:**

Please bring in your posters to the BHS Main office **no later than 4 p.m. on Monday, April 16.**

## **HOW TO GET STARTED:**

- **Supplies:** Archiver's, located at 92nd and Sheridan, is a store that sells products for scrapbooking. This store can help you get ideas. They do not sell poster board so bring your own but they will let you use their cutouts if you buy paper there.
- **Lamination:** Staples on 120th/Sheridan and *Morrell Printing* in Lafayette will laminate posters. If you call ahead to *Morrell* you can have them turn on the laminating machine so that it's all warmed up by the time you get there.
- **Not Too Creative?** Contact Fran Milner, graphic designer, and for a fee, we can create your poster. See contact information below. Deadline for photos/order, is mid-March.

*This is very important for your graduating senior to see their individual poster displayed along with the whole class.*

A MESSAGE FROM BOULDER COUNTY PUBLIC HEALTH  
**JANUARY IS NATIONAL RADON ACTION MONTH**

**Radon is a cancer-causing, radioactive gas.**

Exposure to radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer in the United States and the number one cause among non-smokers. The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) estimated that radon causes more than 20,000 lung cancer deaths in the county each year; only smoking causes more lung cancer deaths.

Radon is a naturally occurring radioactive gas that is released in rock, soil, and water from the natural decay of uranium. While levels of radon outdoors pose a relatively low health risk, radon can build up to dangerous levels inside buildings. Even though you can't see, smell, or taste radon, a high level in your home can have serious consequences. It is especially important to test your home since that is where you spend most of your time.

High levels of radon in homes usually come from the surrounding soil. The gas enters buildings through cracks and openings on the lower levels of the home. Hot spots include basements, first-floor rooms, and garages, but radon can be found anywhere in the house.

**Test for radon to protect your family**

The U.S. Surgeon General recommends that all homes in the U.S. be tested for radon. Testing your house is easy to do, and the winter is an ideal time to test. If your house has a radon problem, you can take simple steps to fix it.

## Un mensaje del departamento de salud del condado de boulder Enero es el Mes Nacional de Radón

### **El radón es un gas radiactivo que causa cáncer.**

La exposición al radón es la segunda causa principal de cáncer pulmonar en los Estados Unidos y la principal en las personas que no fuman. De acuerdo con la Agencia de Protección Ambiental (EPA, por sus siglas en inglés) de los EE.UU. el radón es el causante de más de 20,000 muertes anuales en el país. Solamente el fumar causa más muertes debido al cáncer pulmonar.

El radón es un gas radiactivo que proviene de la descomposición natural del uranio un elemento que está presente en las rocas, el suelo y el agua. Los niveles de radón al aire libre representan un riesgo mínimo para la salud humana, sin embargo este puede acumularse en el interior de cualquier edificio hasta alcanzar niveles perjudiciales para la salud. Usted no puede verlo, olerlo ni probarlo, pero cuando su nivel es elevado dentro del hogar, puede afectar a la salud de toda su familia.

Los niveles altos de radón que se encuentran en los hogares usualmente provienen del suelo de los alrededores. El radón penetra a los pisos más bajos de su hogar a través de grietas y aperturas tales como tapas de pozo de sumidero, y cañerías. Aunque el radón se puede encontrar en cualquier parte de su hogar los lugares más propensos son el sótano, los cuartos del primer piso, y los garajes.

### **Usted debe hacer la prueba de radón.**

El Cirujano General de los EE.UU. recomienda que se haga la prueba de radón en todos los hogares, la cual es fácil de hacer.
